Officer cleared in domestic case

A Lincoln Heights police officer suspended after he was arrested on a domestic violence charge in May will return to his job and get his gun back after a municipal court judge found him not guilty Monday...

Officer LaRoy Smith of Carthage was relieved of his police powers after the arrest and has been on administrative leave since the warrant for his arrest was filed. He returns to work Wednesday.

"He will get his gun back and will get to go back to work," said Clyde Bennett II, Officer Smith's attorney. "Cross-examination indicated (his wife) wasn't credible."

Officer Smith faced a maximum of six months in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine if he had been found guilty. Under a federal law, he also would have lost the right to carry a gun if he had been convicted.

Mr. Bennett said a civil malicious prosecution charge against the woman is being considered.
